- 5. Stand together with others who are calling for urgent action on climate change


Through the AME Church website, you now have access to a robust set of free tools, resources, events, and more to support your climate leadership, including:

Elevate Your Climate Leadership

Below are important steps you can take or start right now to elevate your climate action.

1. Engage Others

- ☐ Craft Your Story. Take a few moments to think about and write down your thoughts on why you have decided to lead on climate solutions. This will help prepare you to discuss your plans with your leadership and your members. Here are some guiding questions: (more ideas, resources, and tools to help you create your story are online at ame-church.com)
 - Why did you decide to lead on climate?
 - What does your faith tradition say about caring for others?
 - What are the needs and wishes of your congregants, and how does your leading on climate help to meet them?
 - How does leading on climate impact your congregation and house of worship?
 - What do you plan to do?
 - What do you hope to achieve for your congregation, community, and creation?

□ Engage your congregation

• Develop a list of members who would be interested in joining and participating in a climate solutions committee.

☐ Engage your peers

• Inspire and empower clergy and laity with actionable information and powerful resources, including sermons, articles, and worship materials.

□ Engage your leaders

 Begin discussions to gain support for you and the congregation leading on climate change and to identify solutions to potential obstacles.

■ Engage elected officials

• Urge AME Church leaders, ministries, congregations, and laity to endorse strong national, state and local climate policies.

□ Commit to becoming climate literate

 Get to know the facts and learn best practices so you can speak effectively about climate impacts and the benefits of solutions.

☐ Inspire collective action

• Let your congregation and community know they can be more effective by collaborating with other like-minded leaders and institutions.

2. Explore the Growing Faith and Climate Network, and Join the Conversation

- ☐ Go to ame-church.com and check out all the site has to offer, including powerful engagement tools, events, and the latest thought leadership on faith and climate.
- ☐ Find out who else is leading on climate change within your community and the AME Church. Connect with them to share thoughts, experiences, and ideas.
- ☐ Share your leadership and progress. Tell friends, family, and colleagues why you are taking action on climate change and how you're making a difference.

3. Reduce Pollution

- ☐ Start with less polluting, more efficient energy use. Look for ways to make your congregations, homes, buildings, and transportation use less energy. Move away from dirty fuels and towards safe, clean energy like wind and solar.
- □ Plant trees and create community gardens to green your public spaces and inspire healthier lifestyles.
- ☐ Purchase climate-friendly supplies and appliances, and implement recycling and composting programs in your homes, schools, facilities, and house of worship.
- **Explore smart transportation.** Encourage congregants to carpool or take public transportation to services, or provide a low-impact shuttle.
- **Be thoughtful about your events.** Choose climate-friendly facilities and caterers for your gatherings, and be mindful of waste when producing materials.
