

Statement of Work Overview

This has been a year of tremendous number of activities, events, programs, and planning at all levels of the Connection. The pandemics of COVID-19, social injustices, food insecurity, financial insecurity and others have had a global and individual impact on our physical, psychological and spiritual health. Our communal and individual peace has been disturbed and disrupted. This has been a trying year for the Commission as we have worked excessive hours in our respective health fields while volunteering our time and talents to the AME Church Connection. Yet, we are a people of faith who believe that our peace can be restored by God. God has empowered the International Health Commission to be the instruments of God through public health and disaster preparedness/response education, partnerships and advocacy.

Collaborations are continuing or expanded to include, but not limited to, the American Heart Association; American Cancer Society; American Red Cross; Chess, LLC; GirlTrek; Prostate Health Education Network; AME Culinary Rx; Alzheimer's Association; The Center for Black Health and Equity; United Postal Service; Cities Changing Diabetes and the World Council of Churches Ecumenical Advocacy Alliance and Health & Healing Consortium.

Work continues with the US Department of Health and Human Services, National Institutes of Health, US Department of Homeland Security, US Department of Federal Emergency Management Agency, US Department of Food and Drug Administration and Centers for Disease Control and Prevention continues. Our Medical Director, Rev. Dr. Miriam Burnett, was invited by the AME Church Ecumenical Officer in collaboration with the National Council of Churches, USA to participate in the World Council of Churches Ecumenical Advocacy Alliance and its new Health & Healing Consortium.

Partnerships with other AME Departments and Commissions were expanded. Many local churches have developed or expanded their health ministries. Several Presiding Elder Districts have organized Health Commissions, however this needs a great deal of further development. This year we can report that most of the Episcopal District Health Directors have been designated.

This report presents a summary statement of some of the highlights of the work of the Commission followed by reports from many of the ministries and several Episcopal District Health Directors.

Training and meetings

Monthly Zoom meetings are held on the last Saturday of every month at 11 AM EST. The change to Saturday allowed global participation. A portion of the monthly meetings was dedicated to training conducted by Dr. Burnett.

Due to COVID-19, the 2020 Quadrennial Training and Meeting was rescheduled to June 25-26, 2021 as virtual gathering. The Quadrennial training will include the required HIV/AIDS. The June 2021 Quadrennial Health Directors training: "Life More Abundantly" included the 3-hour required HIV Training. It included the following workshops:

HIV/AIDS

The Commission seeks to provide information for persons living with and affected by HIV/AIDS. We encourage screening throughout the Connection as well as provide health education through seminars and workshops. We have continued to recommend and encourage the AME Church internationally to support World AIDS Day on Dec 1st and other national days of recognition like National Black HIV/AIDS Day (February 7) and Week of Prayer for the Healing of AIDS held during the 2nd week of March. In addition, we continue to support the work of Rev. Oveta Fuller, PhD, Associate Professor of Microbiology and Immunology at the University of Michigan, who serves as the Health Commission consultant for Communicable Diseases.

A Look Forward

The certification course entitled "Science-Based Understanding of HIV/AIDS for Effective Leaders" created by Rev. Dr. Fuller will continue to be offered annually in conjunction with the Annual Training. This course, available at all levels, will fulfill the requirement set on page 235 of the <u>2016 Doctrine and Discipline of the AME Church.</u>

Communicable Diseases and Immunizations.

Provide information of immunizations. Provide information and updates on communicable diseases that arise during certain times of the year, outbreaks or epidemics, travel health advisories and precautions, recommendations and prevention on AMEChealth.org. We to be plagued with the outbreak of many communicable diseases globally. From COVID-19 to Ebola, the healthcare systems, public health and the outreach of our churches has been tested and tried. Efforts to address these matters was and continues to be multifocal.

2) Updated the vaccine/immunization program description for recommended vaccines

In an effort to maintain an atmosphere of prevention and preparation there are some basic things that must be undertaken:

Maintain good hygiene like proper hand washing techniques

• Keep up healthy habits that will boost your immune system: keep immunizations current, eat healthy, exercise, rest and attempt to reduce stress

 Evaluate and education regarding local and regional considerations for churches and communities: understand what social distancing means and maintain and continue the provision of community based services during an outbreak; how it affects worship, visitation, mutual aid and fiscal management; how to maintain timely and pertinent information dissemination (pulpit, flyers, bulletin inserts, phone tree, class leaders, social media, etc.); how to maintain and utilize existing or acquire necessary resources (volunteers, kitchens, shelters, drivers, food and water); and consider worship and bible study alternatives during periods of social distancing.

A Look Forward

1) Revisit the Disaster Preparedness Plan with expansion to include Epidemic and Pandemic preparedness beyond Influenza Preparation (already included) by utilizing lessons learned.

2) Continue to offer education and prevention video vignettes, webinars, townhalls, etc.

Alzheimer's Association

This three-year partnership enabled us to make new connections in the communities that we serve. This was initiated in the United States with a plan for global dissemination. We worked to increase concern about Alzheimer's disease and awareness of the resources available through the Alzheimer's Association. These important connections provide our congregations and communities with Association care and support services across all of their chapters and access to services like our 24-hour Helpline, both in the US and globally. Additionally, both the International Health Commission and the Alzheimer's Association recognize that engaging our communities in research is vital. Increasing awareness of new findings in risk reduction and facilitating trial participation in the African Diasporic communities are important to reducing the prevalence of this disease and ensuring that future treatments work for all.

Together, we will advocate for research funding and improved access to care that will initially directly impact African American communities and with a goal for global impact. Disaster Preparedness and Response

We recommend and encourage all Episcopal Districts and Churches to participate in the Annual September Disaster Preparedness Month fire drills and evacuation drills. We provide information on preparedness, First Aid and CPR training, Earthquake, and other Natural disaster responses through the Health Commission website (amechealth.org), Twitter and Facebook page as well as through The Christian Recorder. In addition, we provide information on partnerships with the Red Cross, SADA and Medical Corps. Through the American Red Cross, we have partnered to support and encourage Blood Drives and Disaster Preparedness and Response efforts. The American Red Cross help us collaborate with the International Red Cross to provide relief efforts in Malawi after the cyclones in the first quarter of 2022.

Through our partnership with MAP International and the American Red Cross, we were able to ship and distribute an increasing number of supplies in response to many natural disasters and epidemics.

A Look Forward

1)Expand the database of disaster response teams, with an eye toward developing a chapter of the Medical Response Corp.

2)Revisit the Disaster Preparedness Plan with expansion to include Epidemic and Pandemic preparedness beyond Influenza Preparation (already included) by utilizing lessons learned.

3)Continue to expand partnerships.

Mental Health Ministry Toni Johnson Liggins, MD

The Mental Health Ministry focus the first half of the year was on membership since it had not been a functioning ministry for several years. The membership criteria was developed. It includes being a practicing or retired mental health professional including a physician, psychologist, masters-level therapist, chaplain with mental health experience, nurse, or nurse practitioner with mental health experience. The current membership includes 9 members who meet monthly.

The Mental Health Ministry identified trauma as the mental health topic around which to center a national presentation. Psychological trauma is pervasive and yet, it is often ignored or misunderstood. Trauma causes psychological, interpersonal, and physical dysfunction across all demographic groups. Unfortunately, African Americans are often the recipients of multiple types of trauma which impacts us in unique ways. Although evidence-based treatments exist, a lack of understanding and general stigmatization of mental health needs too often prevent referrals for those suffering to treatment and recovery.

AME Culinary RX is an important tool for all communities and especially for communities with limited access to quality health care or health insurance.

IHC hosted the **Annual Clergy** and Clergy Family event in partnership with WIM, Social Action. CONN-MSWAWO+PK's, Lay Organization, **The Christian Recorder**, ITC and Duke **Divinity in July** of 2021 sharing resources and information during a virtual webinar and weekly activities.

Farm and Garden Ministry (FGM) Rev. Carolyn Cavaness

The goal of the FGM is to build the capacity of churches to develop sustainable community gardens, as well as develop pathways to community food security. Home and container gardens are also being encouraged.

FGM, partnered with the Association of African Methodist Episcopal Scouts (AAMES), to support a Spring Gardening contest for A.M.E. Scouts during Spring 2021. AAMES in partnership with the "AME International Health Commission" (Healthy Living Project) and "Friend of AAMES" (FAAMES) held a Gardening Competition under the leadership the Chairman of the Competition, Milton Chambliss (8th). This competition was open to all AME Girl Scouts and Boy Scouts, ages 6 -17, who could participate as individuals or as Troops or Packs. The contest included the following categories of gardens: apartment or confined garden, vertical GRO System with Casters & Drip System, Individual Scout outdoor garden and Scout Troop or Pack – Community Garden.

To assist with this ministry, FGM is in partnership with the Black Church Food Insecurity Network (BCFIN) to provide important resources and training to address food insecurity and food injustice. Over the past year, orientation, trainings, and other technical support were provided to participating churches. After completing the orientation training, twentyfive (25) churches were given seed money in the amount of \$500. The partnership promoted Earth Day (April 22, 2021), the Garden Launch Weekend (April 23 – 25, 2021) and the Faith, Food & Freedom Summer Campaign (June 19 -September 26, 2021).

Farms and gardens produce an abundance of healthy food that can be shared in communities and rural area experiencing food insecurity, lacking access to fresh produce, ability to feed the hungry, and disaster relief. A US and global map of farms and gardens within the AME Church connection and other faith-based communities is currently in development. We are seeking to increase the food supply network along major trucking routes around the Connection. We will create a sustainable food supply network while teaching the economic and health benefits of local farms and gardens. It is also envisioned that this will allow for increased use of Culinary Rx (amechealth.org/culinaryrx).

We continue to focus on capacity-building, planning, and together learning about the food system. We will work closely with churches to assess their food environment, social determinants of health, gardening skills, and inventory relevant physical assets. Churches are being requested to register so that we can inventory resources, connections. This assessment will allow us to develop an action plan. In addition, we will assist churches in establishing or expanding their gardening, health, or food-related ministries. The establishment of miniature Farmers Markets will bring fresh foods to communities while providing a tool for micro- and macro-enterprise.

Differently Abled Ministry Rev. Dr. Marion Morton Crayton

Isaiah 56:7b The Message "Oh yes, my house of worship will be known as a house of prayer for all people."

Due to the challenges presented by the pandemic, some unexpected opportunities or benefits have come for those who typically were unable to physically attend church even before the pandemic.

Many churches found ways to move to virtual platforms via video conferencing platforms such as Zoom or conferencing phone calls. This move has now included persons who were unable to attend church even pre-pandemic. It is our prayer that churches will continue this sharing of the worship experience "outside of the walls" of the church. Churches can sign up for Zoom video conferencing

Activities

1. The pandemic has created a focus on the mental health well-being of God's people. Many persons have and are experiencing grief due to the loss of a loved one or being exposed to traumatic situations such as exposure to killings via news broadcast. The www.GriefShare.org website offers scripturebased tools to use as part of church ministries. We have led two 13-week grief support sessions virtually that are effective. The Advocate enrolled in a 7-month (e.g., October 1, 2021 through April 30, 2022) Clinical Pastoral Education course with Georgetown Medstar University Hospital (GMUH) which accumulated over 400 hours of course work and clinical interfaith visits with patients. The course provided ministerial insight as to how best to support the spiritual needs of persons experiencing an illness as well as supporting persons who have become disabled due to an accident or illness. The Advocate would be happy to share thoughts or reflections on the experience as the opportunity presents.

Seventh Episcopal District Health Commission (AME7 Health Ministry) Jacques Days, MD

The AME7 Health Ministry continues to embrace AMEC IHC Health and Wellness Calendar, choosing one or more topics each month to present to the district as an area of focus. As the AME7 Health Ministry has done COVID-19 Pandemic, we throughout the advised churches and components regarding COVID mitigation planning and preparation for specific activities and helped to coordinate testing, screening, and first aid at varied conference and episcopal district activities. Also, until this quarter, the AME7 Health Ministry has sponsored a child through Compassion International. As of this quarter, we will be sponsoring 2 children. We have collaborated with Alzheimer's Association, South Carolina Cancer Alliance, and Hollings Cancer Center researchers and continue to encourage Alzheimer's awareness, cancer risk modification, and preventative health. We have engaged the South Carolina Department of Health and Environmental Control (DHEC) about health disparities and look forward to forging collaborative work that will improve health equity and access to health resources in the state.

In March, the COVID Advisory Committee developed an update of recommendations for gatherings in the Seventh Episcopal District. In addition, the Health Emergency Planning Commission and the Disaster **Response Preparation Commission collaborated with South Carolina** State University for health emergency and disaster response training. In April, the health focus was autism awareness and information was disseminated to promote awareness. Also, we collaborated with a partner regarding helping seniors access all the benefits of Medicare through a program called "A Better You" and with Hydrolyte/Tree of Life, Black distributors who desire to make gloves, masks, and other pandemic-related goods available at lower cost. 
